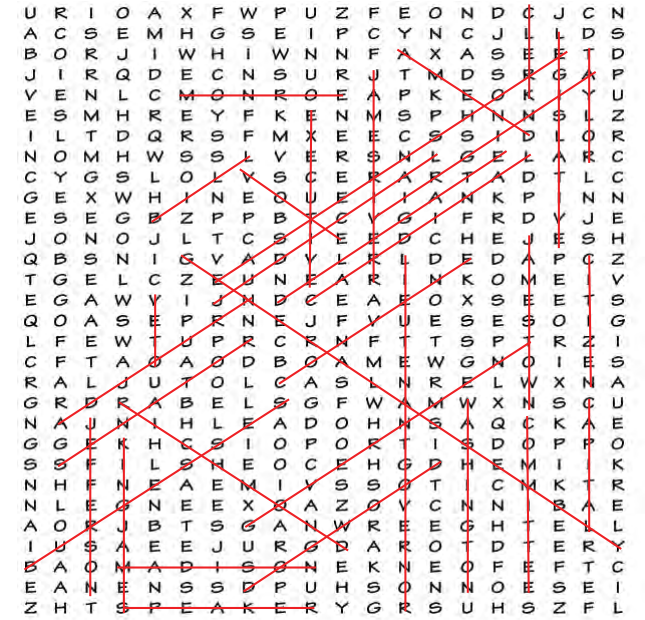

- Yellow- Appalachian Plateau

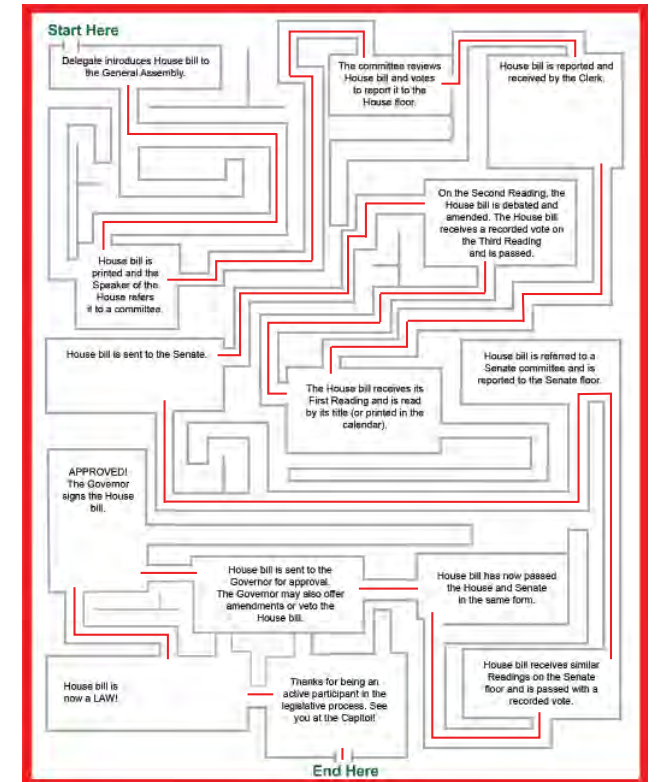

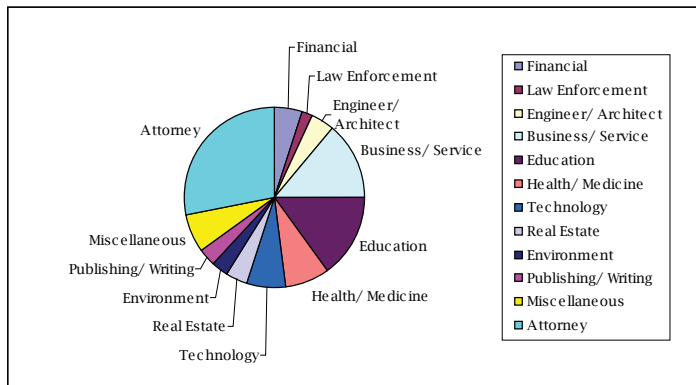
## Women of Virginia Matching

| <u>6</u> | The first African American woman to pass the Virginia Medical Examining Board's examination.   |
| <u>7</u> | This Virginia woman became the leader of the Pamunkey tribe and reluctantly agreed to provide a dozen warriors to help defend the colony of Jamestown against frontier tribes.   |
| <u>4</u> | When her husband was elected president, this Virginia woman knew that her behavior would set precedent for the wives of the country's future chief executives.   |
| <u>1</u> | As Director of information for the Virginia Farm Bureau Federation, her popular textiles attracted customers from throughout the United States and from Asia, Europe, and South America.   |
| <u>5</u> | The first women printer in Virginia and exemplifies colonial Virginia businesswomen.   |
| <u>2</u> | Born enslaved in Dinwiddie County, this Virginia woman was freed, along with her son in 1855 and later helped establish the Contraband Relief Association to provide assistance for black refugees.  |
| <u>3</u> | This woman became known as a frontier legend after being taken captive with her two sons and sister-in-law on July 20, 1755 after Shawnee attacked. In October after her capture, she escaped and traveled five or six hundred miles across mountains and valleys. |

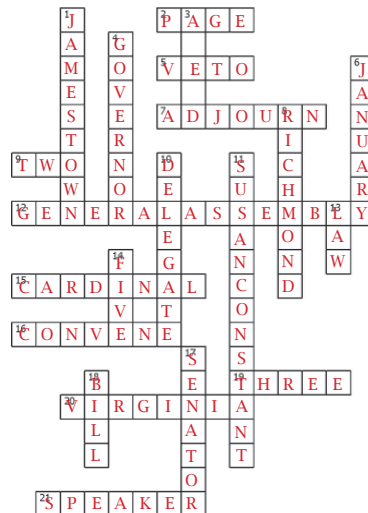
